2009 Guild Challenge It's Easy Being Green Dates: April 11-May 3, 2009

The possibilities with this topic are endless and the way people in this group think, I'm already excited with the results. It seems everywhere today there is discussion about going green. We hear about global warming, different forms of energy, organic everything, bamboo this and that and on and on. You might immediately think of recycling, growing your own food, composting, conserving water, growing a tree, or an all green quilt. By no means do you need to use organic materials or recycled things to participate. Whatever this topic conjures up in you mind will be fascinating. As I announced at the September meeting, the challenge will be different. We will share opening and exhibition space with Wood Creations 2009. PPQG will have the wall space in both the gallery and the foyer and the woodworkers the center space. It gives us plenty of room so get your quilting engines in gear. Each person will be able to submit 2 quilts, exception being participation in group quilts. There will be no size limitations. I'll start distributing entry forms in October. There will be a blue folder in the library with various articles on "Green" topics and ideas. It will be on the shelf where the quilting books begin, over the word Quilting.

The Ultimate Quilt Guild Challenge

Last year, we entered eight of our voted best quilts to the Ultimate Guild Challenge sponsored by American Quilting Society. The dates of our show and the entry requirements for submitting a CD with the 8 quilts we might want to put forward to AQS does not work easily.

Deadline for submitting CD with pictures of the eight chosen quilts is April 1, 2009. Show dates for AQS are July 22-25, 2009 and if accepted, do not have to be received till July 3rd.

The CD submittal date will not work with what we did last year but are close enough if there was a strong desire by guild members to enter this challenge. Anyone interested in planning this effort, please call me. Another option would be to do what we did last year and submit them in 2010. I'm assuming the measurements will still be 30-60" wide and 30-60 " long since they did not change between 2007-2008. I'll also put all the details of the AQS challenge in the blue folder.

Guild Glimmers

Thread quality, tension, needles, and thread delivery are the four basic building blocks of good machine quilting. Cindy Needham explained all this and more at the September Guild meeting, admonishing us that poor quality thread can even ruin a sewing machine.

A quilter for 37 years, Cindy joined Superior Thread Company as a teacher and lecturer. Her beautiful quilts are a testament to her skill and knowledge. Cindy explained some of the differences between various types of thread by weaving several threads among the audience. She introduced Superior's wide array of beautiful threads, including metallic, Egyptian extra-long staple (ELS) cotton, and variegated in a virtual rainbow of delicious colors.

Earlier in the morning, Cindy presented her Open Thread Bar, where quilters sampled as many different threads as they wished. By bringing their own machines to the class, students were able to find out just how certain threads worked on their individual machines. With Cindy's expert guidance, machine tension could be adjusted to get the perfect stitch. It was a unique and worthwhile learning experience for all those attending. Cindy Needham is a lively and interesting teacher, prompting many cries of "We want more!" Perhaps we can have her return for more "thread-ucation."

A big note of thanks goes to Dave Windsor for lugging all of those heavy sewing machines upstairs to the classroom, then bringing them back downstairs again after the class. He was much appreciated.

Once again, I'd like to review the details for QOV as a reminder for long time members and to bring our new members up to date. I have been asked many times which quilt patterns and colors are the most

Over the past four years, more than 16,000 Quilts of Valor have been awarded. Throughout the process of presenting quilts

to

wounded
veterans, it has been observed that
quilts that are patriotic in color and
theme go fast. Red, white and
blue colors are popular, as well
as eagles, stars, stripes and flag
themes. For some suggested
free patterns and general inspiration
go to http://qovf.org . The pictured quilts are
patterns available on that site. At the same time, it has
also been observed that quite a few folks like general
themed quilts. Ultimately, whatever pattern and colors
you choose, your quilt will be appreciated by one of our

servicemen or women.

Labels are very important for several reasons. By documenting when, where and who made the quilt, it becomes a personalized gift for the recipient. At a recent presentation of quilts, a QOV recipient received an unlabeled quilt. Although she adored her QOV, she felt her quilt needed that QOV label in order to really validate it. Last year several of our members sent along notes or journeys about the making of their quilt

and their thoughts about the person who would receive the quilt. These notes and journals were well received by the soldiers. This is something you can do if you wish, but please, if you are not comfortable with the journal idea do not let that stop you from making a QOV. Many of us just put a nice label on our quilts.

The minimum quilt size is 50"x60". The maximum size is 72"x 87". The ideal size is 54"x67".

The presentation case is simply the gift-wrapping that goes around your Quilt of Valor. The case is basically a custom made pillowcase that can be made out of any fabric you desire. Some people make their presentation case coordinate with the fabrics in their quilt. Others

like to make them out of whimsical fabrics.

And, some customize theirs
by putting a fancy bottom or
decoration. The easiest way to
make this simple case is to fold
your finished quilt and take its
measurements. Then find some
fabric you like, fold it and sew the
sides together. The case provides a
tidy finish to your gift and functions
as a safe place to store this special
keepsake for each recipient.

If you wish to have your QOV quilted by a long-armer, please put your quilt into my care by Nov. 15th. Once your quilt is quilted, it will be returned to you to complete the binding and the label. The label will need

to include the long arm quilter name as well as yours. I will provide that information for you. The quilts we sent in last year came back beautifully quilted; however the back and forth mailing can be costly. Because of time and cost, many of our members are opting to quilt their own pieces. I will be happy to receive your finished QOV at any guild meeting. A big "Thank you" to the ladies who have finishes their quilts. They are all beautiful. The February date to deliver our quilts has not yet been finalized. Once the date is set, I will send you that information. If you have any questions please call me at 785-3814.
